- Unexpected Visitor emerged from SFNFF's storytelling and filmmaking May workshops. World premier from first time local writer/director!
- 2506 is a story of young love, crime and regret; The Circle follows a young man lost, spiritually and literally, as he faces a circle of Elders rather than a courtroom, and finds his voice, on Country
- 2 films from award winning First Nations filmmakers No Way to Forget (1996) and Prison Songs (2015) - remind us of the injustices and inequities behind high rates of incarceration
- Program ends with a story of resilience, determination and hope, One Heart, One Mind (2024)

The Shoalhaven First Nations Film Festival celebrates the creativity and diversity of First Nations filmmakers from across Australia and from our own community.

The 2nd annual SFNFF will begin with a **Welcome to Country and Smoking Ceremony provided by Gadhungal Marring** in the forecourt of <u>Huskisson Pictures</u> at 12.30pm.

The selection of films was based on the dual themes of:

- 1. Celebrating the achievements of First Nations People guided by the wisdom of the Elders and the remarkable determination of those who sought and secured recognition and rights
- 2. Recognising that there is still a long way to go in many areas to achieve rightful justice and equality, with the focus on the factors leading to high rates of incarceration and the continuing tragedy of deaths in custody

Unexpected Visitor, written and directed by Tolbin Parsons, is an extraordinary achievement from an 18-year-old from Nowra. From a story he first told at the SFNFF storytelling and filmmaking workshops in May, Tolbin developed the script for Unexpected Visitor, and together with Jamie Lepre, a South Coast filmmaker, crafted the short film that will be screened for the first time on 13 September.

Telling Their Stories, a short documentary, filmed and edited by local multidisciplinary creative and art therapist, Julie Cunningham, shows glimpses into how participants developed their stories within the workshops.

No Way to Forget, Richard Frankland's powerful short film, and Kelrick Martin's **Prison Songs** remind us of the injustices and inequities behind high rates of incarceration amongst First Nations People that continue thirty years after the Royal Commission into Aboriginal Deaths in Custody.

2506 and **The Circle** reflect young people's understanding of the impact of the cycles on incarceration on their lives. In **2506**, young people use their own experiences of crime, love and hardship to create a unique blend of hip-hop and musical cinema. **The Circle** shows the power of traditional forms of justice, as a young man, caught between two worlds, and lost, spiritually and literally, faces a circle of Elders rather than a courtroom. Sent to work with his Uncle on Country, he finds his voice and a way to face his own past.

One Heart, One Mind, offers a message of hope as Larissa Behrendt traces the 50-year struggle for land rights recognition and the resilience and determination of those most hurt and affected by the defeat of the Voice referendum.
